ORDER

Due to the continuing public health and safety issues resulting from Coronavirus Disease 2019 and SARS-CoV-2 (the virus that causes the disease)—which we refer to simply as “COVID-19”—and consistent with guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and other public health authorities, the United States District Court for the District of New Hampshire issues the following order restricting public access.

Effective immediately, the following people shall not enter the Rudman Courthouse or the Cleveland Federal Building:

- Persons who will not wear a mask or face covering that covers their noses and mouths and stay at least 6 feet from others. The court will provide a mask/face covering for those seeking entry who do not have their own covering.
- Persons who have a temperature of greater than 100.4.
- Persons experiencing any of the following symptoms within the past 10 days:
  - Chills
  - Cough (unless due to allergies or asthma)
  - Shortness of breath/difficulty breathing (unless due to allergies or asthma)
  - Fatigue
  - Headache (that is unusual for you)
  - Loss of taste/smell
  - Sore throat
  - Congestion or runny nose
  - Nausea, vomiting, or diarrhea
  - Muscle or body aches
  - Other symptoms of COVID-19 identified by the CDC in the future

- If you have tested positive for COVID-19 and experienced symptoms, you may not enter the courthouse until:
  - at least 14 days have passed since you first experienced symptoms, AND
  - you have been symptom-free for at least 3 days.
- If you have tested positive for COVID-19 but did not have symptoms, you may not enter the courthouse until:
  - at least 14 days have passed since you tested positive.
- If you have had contact with anyone who has tested positive for COVID-19, you may not enter the courthouse:
  - until at least 14 days have passed since the contact occurred, AND
  - during those 14 days, you have not developed any symptoms.
- Persons who have been asked to self-quarantine by any doctor, hospital or health agency within the past 14 days.
- If you have traveled to or from New Hampshire in the past 14 days, you may not enter the courthouse unless:
  - your travel was restricted to or from the New England states (Maine, Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut or Rhode Island), OR
  - you self-quarantined for at least 14 days after you entered New Hampshire, OR
  - you self-quarantined for at least 14 days in a state outside New England prior to arriving in New Hampshire and you did not travel to New Hampshire on public transportation, OR
  - your entrance is related to your role in an in-court hearing or jury trial and has been pre-approved (consistent with guidance from CDC, NH, and court's retained infectious disease expert) by the presiding judge, OR
  - you are entering the Rudman Courthouse and your entrance has been pre-approved (consistent with guidance from CDC, NH, and court's retained infectious disease expert) by the administrative head of the court unit or security agency you are visiting, OR
  - you are entering the Cleveland Building and your entrance has been pre-approved (consistent with guidance from CDC, NH, and court's retained infectious disease expert) by the agency you are visiting.

For contact tracing purposes, people entering the Rudman Courthouse will be asked to identify themselves and provide contact information by court security officers or court staff.

Anyone attempting to enter in violation of these protocols, or who decline to identify themselves upon request, will be denied entry or asked to vacate the courthouse by court security officers.

These access restrictions have been imposed pursuant to 41 C.F.R. § 102-74.375(b).

This order supersedes the court's order on Restricted Access to Rudman Courthouse and Cleveland Federal Building, ADM-1, 20-28, dated August 5, 2020, and takes effect immediately.
